AFFIDAVIT OF MARILYN E. KIANI

I, Marilyn E. Kiani, declare that the following statements are true and correct based on my personal observation, knowledge and interactions with PF Lazor.

I grew up in Eureka, California, and lived there until I finished college in 1970. I moved to Hollywood for a year, where my mom lived at the time, and then moved to Oakland. I've lived here since 1971.

I've worked mainly in office jobs. My last and longest was managing a store for Big Shot, Inc., a business specializing in photography in big sizes. I worked there for about 11 years; first in the San Francisco store, and later, in the store they opened in Hayward.

I was married in 1984 to Khusrow Kiani. My husband was originally from Iran. I continued to work for Big Shot until the middle of August, wehn I left to have a baby. Since that time, I have been home with our son, Alex, who is almost three years old now. Over the past three years, I've worked on remodeling our home, and I've taken classes in real estate through Merritt College to prepare myself for a career in that field. I passed the sales licensing test last March.

I met PF Lazor, I believe, in 1979. I was dating a musician who had known PF as a fellow musician. At the time he was busy with his musical career as Buddy Holly, Jr. I think I first met him over lunch, when they talked music, and PF took "notes" by using his ever-present tape recorder to keep track of things he wanted to remember. I was impressed with his composure and the business-like manner of someone so young.

Over the months, we saw PF and his group play in several places in San Francisco, and I was really hoping he would be a success with that career. He was such a good singer, and his Buddy Holly show was an exciting act. The last time I saw PF perform was at a junior college in Newark. He was his same enthusiastic self in that small setting as he was before a crowd at a club.

I stopped seeing the musician I was dating, but remained friends with PF, and he kept in touch for awhile after that.

I was very surprised -- stunned, really -- to receive a letter from PF in 1934 saying that he was in prison. What he has written to me about what happened to him goes against everything I know and feel about PF as a person. I'm sure there are people that have known PF much better and longer than I, but there are some people you meet in life and immediately feel a sense of trust and rapport with, and I felt that way towards PF.

I wish I had known of PF's arrest and trial. I would have liked to have attended

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it. It is so hard to believe his trial was conducted in the manner he described ϖ me. It gives me very mixed feelings about our court system, to say the least.

I hope PF will get a fair rehearing of his case soon, with proper representation by a competent attorney.

I declare under penalty of perjury that the foregoing is true and correct to the best of my knowledge.
